“In the international ‘Feline Beauty’ competition, at least one of the cats was adorable.” Daily Mail.

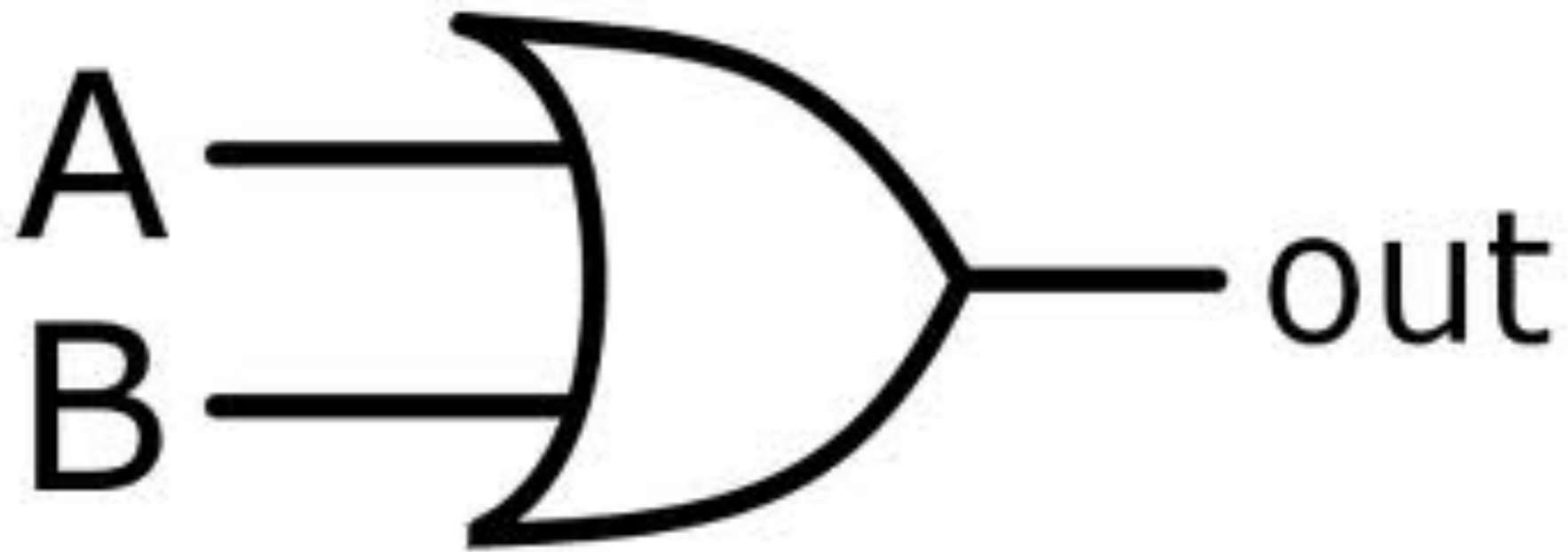
